Why Is It Necessary to Determine If There is Federal Assistance	
	In order to determine whether Title VI, Title IX, and other grant related nondiscrimination statutes apply to the programs or activities of an entity, it must be determined whether the entity is a recipient of federal financial assistance. It is also necessary to determine which federal agencies fund an entity believed to be discriminating to determine which federal agency or agencies complaints should be sent to.

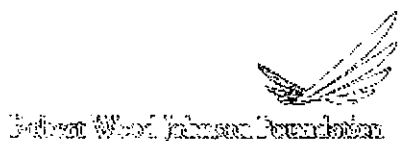

About the Program

Speaking Together: National Language Services Network (NLSN) is a new Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) national program that will support hospitals to improve the quality and availability of health care language services for patients with limited English proficiency (LEP). Speaking Together: National Language Services Network has four goals:

- To improve communication between patients with LEP and their health care providers.
- To work in partnership with hospitals to develop models of high-quality language services.
- To develop useful measures in the area of language services to enable hospitals to conduct ongoing measurement of effectiveness and create performance benchmarks.
- To encourage the spread of successful strategies to increase language services within and across hospitals and health systems.

The core component of Speaking Together: National Language Services Network is a 16-month-long hospital learning collaborative that will foster shared learning and innovation among all program participants. Sites selected to participate in the collaborative will receive grants of up to \$60,000, as well as technical assistance and training using measures developed by the National Program Office (NPO). The George Washington University Medical Center will serve as the NPO for this program.

Eligible sites are non-federal, general acute-care hospitals that have a minimum of 10,000 discharges per year and serve substantial numbers of patients with LEP. Hospitals must currently be operating a language services program that involves on-site professional interpreter(s). Eligibility is not contingent upon the language(s) spoken by the patients served at the hospital.

This program provides a safe and appropriate environment for minors during the interim period between the minor's transfer into an UAC shelter care facility and the minor's release from custody by the ORR or removal from the United States.

- **Cuban/Haitian Initiative**

The Cuban/Haitian Initiative provides assistance to and serves communities affected by Cuban and Haitian entrants and refugees.

- **Services for Survivors of Torture Program**

The Treatment of Torture Victims/Survivors Program provides treatment for all victims of torture regardless of their immigration status. Services may include mental health and psychological services; legal and social services; and research and training for health care providers outside of treatment centers or programs.

- **Assistance under the Trafficking Victims Protection Act**

This State Letter provides background information on the trafficking of human beings into the United States, the requirements for certification, the documents that victims of severe forms of trafficking will present and the procedures agencies should follow in confirming eligibility for benefit.

- **Repatriation**

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Access Fund Grant Information

The Legal Foundation of Washington's Access Fund Grant Program makes available one-time grants up to \$2,000 to programs that provide civil legal aid to low income people in Washington State.

Access Fund grants are available to support projects that will address language-related barriers to civil legal aid. Eligible projects include, but are not limited to: translation of educational materials, hiring interpreter services, and training volunteer interpreters.

Access Fund applications may be made to the Foundation at any time. However, because funds are limited it is best to apply early in the calendar year as funds may be depleted before year's end. Grant funds must be utilized in the calendar year in which they are awarded.

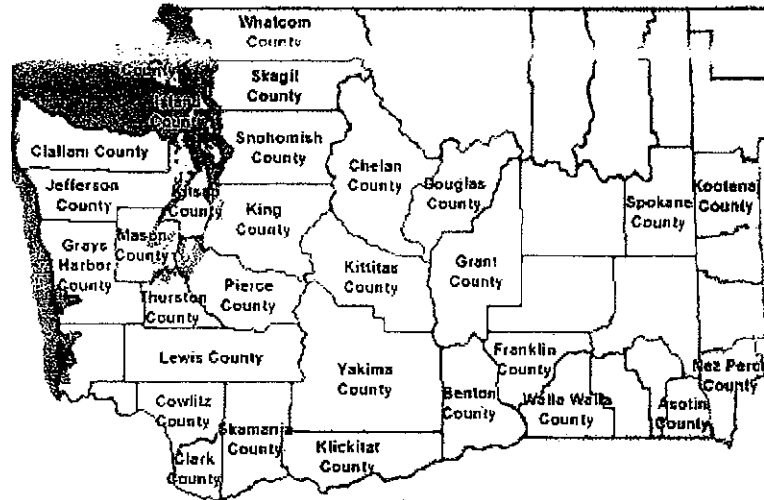
